


















Non-living Things

There are two main groups of non-living things.

<p>Non-living things that were once alive (Made from plant or animal parts, i.e. natural materials)</p>	<p>Non-living things that were never alive (Made from man-made materials or materials from the ground)</p>
<p>Wool is the body covering of sheep. E.g. a woollen sweater</p> 	<p>E.g. a plastic toy</p> 
<p>Rubber is made from the latex of rubber trees. E.g. a rubber ball</p> 	<p>E.g. a pair of spectacle frames</p> 
<p>Silk is spun by the silkworm. E.g. a silk blouse</p> 	<p>E.g. a clay pot</p> 
<p>Leather is the skin of animals like the crocodile, the snake etc. E.g. a leather handbag</p> 	<p>E.g. a porcelain mug</p> 
<p>Cotton comes from the cotton plant. E.g. a cotton T-shirt</p> 	<p>E.g. ceramic floor tiles</p> 

Non-living things that were once alive	Non-living things that were never alive
<p>Paper comes from trees. E.g. a book</p> 	<p>E.g. gold jewellery</p> 
<p>Hair / Fur comes from animals like the goat, sheep and leopard. E.g. a leopard's fur coat</p> 	<p>E.g. a windowpane</p> 
<p>Wood comes from trees. E.g. wooden furniture</p> 	<p>E.g. a computer</p> 
<p>Feathers come from the body covering of a bird. E.g. a feather duster</p> 	<p>E.g. a stone statue</p>
